

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
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INTRODUCTION BY THE CHAIR,

Tina Smith

The Trustees' Report and Annual Review for October 2022 to September 2023 reflects a year of transformational change for The Queen's Club Foundation (QCF). It was an honour for me to succeed our longstanding Chair, Baroness Amanda Sater and I'm hugely grateful to our Foundation team and to our Trustees for all their dedication and commitment in taking The QCF forward in our mission to improve lives through racket sports.

Our work this year has focused on widening community participation especially to those who may not have access to racket sports, often because of background or circumstances. 76% of our participants have been from ethnic minorities and we have also had a strong focus on disability, mental health and women and girls - all showing significant figures in our Impact Report.

A key highlight of the year was an inspirational opportunity for 16 girls to meet and play with Emma Radacanu. These girls, from local state

school Sacred Heart High in Hammersmith, had all been trained by The QCF as LTA Youth Leaders, as part of our drive to build a new female workforce. The on-court session was delivered by our Head of Foundation and the girls have since utilised their skills at local Borough tennis events that have also been organised by The QCF.



Our impact figures demonstrate the contribution The QCF is making locally to children and adults who participate in our

community club activities, which are almost all free or heavily subsidised - over 500 local participants benefitting this year up from around 300 the previous year. We are also proud that inclusivity is at the forefront of everything The QCF has delivered this year and our regular community club festivals offer an amazing experience with wonderfully positive feedback from those attending.

The majority of our work continues to take place locally, yet increasingly our work has national recognition (due to the excellent programmes, social media exposure and our link with The Queen's Club itself). Our on-court activation events surrounding the cinch Championships (the ATP 500 tennis event held in June) show the local impact we are having on children and their families enabling us to deliver community sport in line with the LTA's message of "Tennis Opened Up" locally and inspiring others nationally.

Fundraising continues to be a major focus for our charity. We are most grateful to The Queen's Club Board, The Queen's Club (QC) and its members for the support we receive. Our November fundraising dinner and December end of year Team Challenge Festival, both held at Queen's, raised significant funds


from QC members and the wider public. We were fortunate to have Gartner employees volunteering at the festival and money raised was match-funded by Gartner.

The QCF is also grateful to The LTA Tennis Foundation for awarding us a three-year grant in support of our community outreach programmes and to help us develop a community hub site. This grant, generous individual donations, support from The Queen's Club and other Foundations have put us on a firmer financial footing with total income this financial year of over £190k up from the previous year of over £52K. However, we will be continuing to look at ways to improve our long-term financial sustainability by generating regular recurring income through the introduction of initiatives such as a Friends' scheme, a Major Donor's scheme and a Legacy scheme.

Key enablers of our success this year have been to streamline our governance structure and to improve our organisation platform, both better supporting our newly refined vision and mission. The launch of the new QCF logo, incorporating the interlocking QC, has been a significant development and symbolises the close relationship with The Queen's Club as its

official charity. In tandem, the launch of our new website www.queensclubfoundation.co.uk has aided and improved communication of who we are and what we do.

On behalf of The Trustees, I would like to thank all those who have contributed over the year to the vibrant health of the Charity – including coaches, volunteers, club members, staff at the Club, The QCF office team and all our incredibly generous donors and partners, without whom we would not be able to make such a difference and continue "improving lives through racket sports".



REVIEW BY THE HEAD OF THE FOUNDATION

This year has been an exciting one for The QCF. We firmly established ourselves as a trusted community sports provider. We consolidated and refined existing outreach programmes offered via our free primary schools squash programme and via our expanding free tennis programme, as well as offering tasters for local schools in real tennis and delivering subsidised programmes targeted towards increasing the numbers of girls playing tennis.

We successfully increased the numbers of those benefiting from our delivery from 300 to over 500 children. I am delighted with the curriculum time squash programme, where 5 schools regularly receive coaching at The Club including for the first time, a SEND school for children with speech, language and communication difficulties. We demonstrated our commitment to a fully inclusive approach to all of our sessions. We also highlighted delivery to those with specific disabilities such as our

joint event with Metro Blind Sports, supported by Middlesex tennis, which showcased Visually Impaired tennis and enabled our community club coaches to upskill in learning how to deliver tennis to the visually impaired.



Our event with Emma Raducanu was not only inspiring for the LTA Youth Leaders involved, but also showcased our keen support to develop a female coaching workforce in a sport which needs more female coaches. We continued to support and mentor those who volunteer with

us and were proud to be able to support one of our junior volunteers in achieving her LTA Level 1 coaching qualification. Our Summer Rave camps at Fulham Boat Reach Club's Free Water Sports Week, were a key example of how we can add value to the physical, emotional and mental well-being of local secondary school children through sport. The camps addressed issues of lack of appropriate summer activities, involvement with anti-social behaviour and the tennis activities provided by The QCF were extremely well received. We are also pleased to have developed our relationship with the West London Partnership, delivering several tennis camps at St Paul's School for local nonfee-paying school children. Many of these children had not had an opportunity previously to try tennis as it was not a sport provided by their school and these camps as well as other regular weekly classes demonstrate how we are removing barriers to participation and opening up opportunities for all.

Our new look impact report shows how focused our activities this year have been on marginalised communities. We will continue going forwards to build on these foundations and increase the numbers of those participating from such communities across our programmes. In the future I am looking





TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their annual report, incorporating the directors' report, for the purpose of the Charities Act 2011 and sections 415 to 419 of the Companies Act 2016, together with the accounts for the year ended 30 September 2023. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (FRS 102) in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the Charity

STRUCTURE GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Queen's Club Foundation is a charitable company, incorporated on 19 February 2015 (registered company number 09449213) governed by a Memorandum of Association and registered as a charity 28 October 2015 (registered charity number 1164144). The Foundation is the Official Charity of The

Queen's Club and is supported by The Queen's Club Board, staff and Members. The Board, in pursuit of its objectives is pleased with the progress it has made.

The Trustees (listed on page 3) are Trustees of the Charity and Members & Directors of the Company. Trustees are appointed by an ordinary resolution of the member Trustees of the Charity and as set out in the Articles of Association.

When considering new Trustees, the Board has regard to the requirement for any specialist skills, for example past experience in organising charitable events, fundraising skills, knowledge of inclusive sport, as well as past experience in serving similar charities. New Trustees undergo a briefing on: their legal obligations under charity and company law, the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit, and

are informed of the content and how to access to the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the committee and decision-making processes, the business plan and recent financial performance of the Charity.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The main objects of the Charity, as defined in the Governing Documents, are:

For the public benefit the promotion of community participation, especially among children and young people, in healthy recreation in particular in the sports of lawn tennis, real tennis, squash and rackets (the Sports) and to assist in the development of the skills of those playing the Sports in such ways as are exclusively charitable according to the laws of England and Wales as the Trustees think fit, including but not limited to, by:

1. Providing grants to other charities that promote community participation in the sports; and 2. Providing grants and other financial assistance to or for the benefit of children and young people in need of such assistance, to allow them to participate in one

or more of the Sports

In determining the activities to be undertaken by the Charity in furtherance of these objects, the Trustees have given regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The QCF safeguarding policy has been placed on the QCF website.

This year The Queen's Club Foundation has moved its focus towards the promotion of community participation through delivery of coach-led sessions rather than through providing grants to individuals and organisations. The Trustees took this decision in order to maximise the impact of The QCF locally and to ensure the charity made a real difference to people's lives through sport.

TENNIS COMMUNITY CLUB

Our tennis programmes run during term time giving children aged 6-10 from Hammersmith & Fulham the chance to learn to play and enjoy the game. Most classes are free of charge and take place after school once a week at our three community venues: Rocks Lane, Bishop's Park, Brook Green and Ravenscourt Park.

Those who show promise are invited to attend the Sunday Community Club session at The Queen's Club to further develop their skills in an inspirational setting. We hosted 3 major Tennis Family Festivals at The Queen's Club inviting children and their parents/carers from our programmes for a fun afternoon

of tennis and competitive games. We invited national Junior Players and an international parastanding player to play exhibition tie-breaks at the festivals as inspiration for the attendees.

TENNIS IMPACT 2022-2023

Launched new dementia friendly classes reaching 22 adults.

Identified 16 children from the Community Club local venues to receive further coaching at The Queen's Club.

Hosted *3 Community Club Family Festivals* at The Queen's Club attended by 99 children in total.

Delivered community coaching at 3 parks venues in Hammersmith & Fulham to 121 children, 53% of which were girls.

WOMEN & GIRLS



SEND TENNIS

Serving those with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities



We ran weekly classes for children from a specialist special educational needs school in Hammersmith and Fulham, introducing children with autism, downs syndrome, and other special educational needs to the sport.

The sessions ended with a fun team challenge event in June and as a result, the school was given tickets by the LTA to attend the cinch Championships at Queen's.

We hosted a joint event with Metro Blind Sports and Middlesex Tennis at The Queen's Club to showcase visually impaired tennis.

SENIORS DEMENTIA FRIENDLY TENNIS

Our pioneering dementia friendly social tennis classes provided an opportunity for the over 65's who might be socially isolated or have disabilities to be active and enjoy sense of community through tennis. We partnered with the Masbro Elders Project in Hammersmith to advertise the class in Bishop's Park which is now regularly attended.

QCF AT CINCH 2023

Each year in June, The Queen's Club hosts one of the biggest tournaments of the ATP calendar, the cinch Championships, attracting tennis fans from around the world giving the The QCF an opportunity to showcase its work at the prestigious event.



This year The QCF was invited to take part in two pre-match coin tosses at the Championships which were enthusiastically carried out by two girls from our Community Club.

At the tournament the WTA celebrated its 50-year anniversary, giving Olympia from our LTA Youth Girls programme a special moment on Centre Court to join WTA founding member Ingrid Löfdahl Bentzer, former British number one Clare Wood and WTA President Micky Lawler.

The QCF's promotional video was played on the big screens throughout the event to spread awareness.

Following the event, thanks to The Queen's Club Chairman Simon Greenwell, The QCF invited a group of Community Club players to play on Centre Court. Some were so inspired they began competing at local competitions during the summer.

DEVELOPING THE COACHING WORKFORCE

LTA Youth Leaders

The QCF coaching team is passionate about inspiring and training the next generation of coaches, leaders and volunteers.

Our QCF tutors, Kate Maurici and Laura Slater delivered the LTA Youth Leaders Programme to 30 teenagers throughout the school year at two venues: The Queen's Club and Sacred Heart School in Hammersmith.

Many of these leaders supported the coaches in running the Hammersmith & Fulham School's Games, supervising and scoring matches in a two-day event with 120 children in Years 3 & 4 from 12 schools.

Coaches & Volunteers

We have developed our Community Club coaching team to include 14 LTA Accredited coaches.

We have 50% female coaches on the team including a female Head Coach.

We invited 30 volunteers in total from Gartner and Goldman Sachs to assist at our festivals

We provided CPD in partnership with Middlesex Tennis for our coaching team at the Metro Blind Sports day, giving our coaches a valuable opportunity to learn about and experience visually impaired tennis with demonstrations from top-ranked national players.

We invited our coaching team to The Club for a social event and feedback session.







CASE STUDIES

West London Partnership (WLP) Launch

In July we ran an outreach day for young people aged 12-13 from two state schools in the WLP. Our coaches ran a tennis session at St. Paul's School for 18 secondary school pupils with a mixture of cardio tennis and friendly competition.

One teacher responded that her 11 pupils had an improved attitude towards sport as a result of attending and agreed that the event had a positive effect on the pupils and their learning capabilities. The demographics for this school were 30% from a diverse ethnic background and 20% had families known to experience financial hardship.

They absolutely loved it! It was wonderful for pupils to play a sport they do not get offered at school. They came back suggesting they put it forward to our Junior Leadership Team as a sport to be on offer.

In the Academic Year 2022-2023, The QCF Squash Community Club, in partnership with charity Squash Squared, worked with 5 schools to reach 123 pupils.



Real Tennis and Squash Outreach Days

We also launched our Real Tennis and Squash outreach days at The Club, where primary schools can enjoy coming in and receiving taster sessions in both sports, led by The Queen's Club pros, as well as enjoying their packed lunches at The Club.

Inspirational Tournament Visits

We enabled children from our squash Community Club to attend the Optasia Squash Championships through our partnership with Squash Squared and others to attend the Laver Cup through our links with the LTA Tennis Foundation.

We are committed to ensuring that we operate transparently, responsibly and in a sustainable way.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The combined income from all of these sources is used to support the promotion and delivery of community activity in racket sports as well as the management of that activity and our daily overheads. Our financial performance for the year ending September 2023 has been particularly strong. We have produced a gross income of £190,372 (2022: £55,265), a significant increase on past years. In our drive to generate more sustainable income we applied successfully to organisations and family foundations. This was a significant move away from an events based income strategy and one which we intend to continue. We also benefited from a generous donation from The Queen's Club, which enabled us to devote more time to looking at other income streams to maximise our activities for the public benefit.

At the balance sheet date, our total funds amounted to £219,858 (2022: £143,102), with restricted funds totalling £24,546 (2022: £52,852) and free reserves of £195,312 (2022: £90,250).



THE FUTURE

In the Academic Year 2023-2024 *The QCF* will continue to build upon the strong foundations that it has built in delivering excellence in community outreach.

With the cost of living set to negatively impact local communities and physical education not prioritised in schools, our programmes will be more important than ever in giving vulnerable children and adults the chance to participate and thrive through racket sports.

Our core focus will be on serving children and young people from lower socio-economic backgrounds and minority groups.

We hope to see an increase in the number of children accessing our programmes through the creation of a community hub venue so that children who have completed 2-3 years of our programmes can continue progressing with their tennis and feel the social, mental and physical benefits of the sport.

We aim to expand our SEND offering to work with another SEND school and will host a Disability Festival in Spring 2024 and will see a rise in the number of adults accessing our dementia friendly classes and will place an increased focus on serving refugee communities.

We will continue to focus on serving Women & Girls and hope to see an increase in the number of schools accessing the LTA Youth Girls programme.



We will strengthen our partnerships with local charities and organisations such as the Fulham Reach Boat Club and the Fulham Football Foundation collaborating and convening inspiring events to increase our collective impact.

In the 2023-2024 Academic
Year, proposed expansion of The
QCF Squash programme will
include increasing numbers of
participants in our Queen's Club
sessions as well as outreach into
schools, saving schools the time
and resources needed to travel
to The Queen's Club and reach
schools where there are fewer
facilities. This will increase the
number of pupils who will benefit
from accessing the benefits of
squash.

STATEMENT OF THE TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustees (who are also the directors of The Queen's Club Foundation for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

ACCOUNTING POLICIES



The Queen's Club Foundation is an incorporated charity, limited by guarantee, incorporated in England with the company number 09449213. In the event of the Charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the Charity. The address of the registered office is given in the Charity information page of these financial statements. The nature of the Charity's operations and principal activities are outlined in the Report of the Trustees.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011 and UK Cenerally

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

Cash flow statement

The Charity does not include a statement of cash flows on the grounds that it is applying FRS 102 Section 1A.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the Charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably, and it is probable that the income will be received.

For donations to be recognised the Charity will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the donation and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the Charity and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Donated facilities and donated professional services are recognised in income at their fair value when their economic benefit is probable, it can be measured reliably and the charity has control over the item. Fair value is determined on the basis of the value of the gift to the Charity. For example the amount the Charity would be willing to pay in the open market for such facilities and services. A corresponding amount is recognised in

Income from trading activities includes income earned from fundraising events and trading activities to raise funds for the Charity. Income is received in exchange for supplying goods and services in order to raise funds and is recognised when entitlement has occurred.

Investment income is earned through holding assets for investment purposes such as shares. It includes dividends and interest. Where it is not practicable to identify investment management costs incurred within a scheme with reasonable accuracy the investment income is reported net of these costs. It is included when the amount can be measured reliably. Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method and dividend and rent income is recognised as the Charity's right to receive payment is established.

Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. It is categorised under the following expenditure headings:

? Raising funds; includes the costs of organising events and other costs of fundraising

? Charitable activities; includes grants to third parties and the costs of administering the Charity inclusive of governance costs.

Grants payable to third parties are within the charitable objectives. Where unconditional grants are offered, this is accrued as soon as the recipient is notified of the grant, as this gives rise to a reasonable expectation that the recipient will receive the grants. Where grants are conditional relating to performance then the grant is only accrued when any unfulfilled conditions are outside of the control of the Charity.

Support costs are those that assist the work of the Charity but do not directly represent charitable activities and include office costs, governance costs, administrative payroll costs. They are incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the Charity. Where support costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources. The analysis of these costs is included in Note 6.

VAT

The Charity is not registered for VAT and is unable to recover VAT incurred. On this basis costs are recorded inclusive of VAT within the Statement of Financial Activities.

Taxatio

The Charity is considered to pass the tests set out in sections 466 to 493 Corporation Tax Act 2010 (CTA 2010), as such no income tax is payable on the Charity's activities.

Debtors receivable and creditors payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. In addition, it includes cash at bank and in hand and cash balances within the investment portfolio available for investment transaction purposes.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted general funds are incoming resources receivable or generated for use in furtherance of the general objects of the Charity without restriction.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the Trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The Trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the Charity to be able to continue as a going
